PRF-TFRM CHECKLIST

Below is a checklist of important action items and activities to help you prepare for success in the upcoming term.

☐ Watch the Student Tech Orientation Video

This video provides you with a resource to successfully navigate myNIC and NIC's digital learning platforms. It's important to view this video before the start of the term.

☐ Access myNIC & NIC email

After the initial welcome email from NIC Admissions is sent to your personal email address, ALL future communications will be sent to your new NIC student email address, including important things to do and know prior to your start date. It's imperative that you check your myNIC account frequently before the start of class.

□ Pay Student Fees BEFORE the First Day of Class

Most students are required to pay lab fees, learner resource fees and North Island Student Union (NISU) fees before the first day of class. Find out how much you owe and your payment options using your myNIC account. Each school district differs in how they sponsor tuition and fees. Connect with your high school directly to find out more about what fees you're responsible for paying.

☐ Familiarize with Online Learning Platforms

Whether delivered face to face, blended or online, many courses may utilize Brightspace. Information and tips for navigating Brightspace are found at library.nic.bc.ca/studenttech/Brightspace

Not all courses will utilize Brightspace, we recommend contacting your instructor directly for more information if it's unclear.

☐ Purchase Textbooks and Supplies

Most dual credit students are required to purchase their own books and supplies. Book Search is an online tool used to find and order required texts. You can also visit campus stores in person for assistance with books and supplies. It's important you purchase the correct materials. You will need to know your course code (e.g., BUS-162) and the section number (e.g., CVS1). If you're unsure, please check with your high school before purchasing.

☐ Connect with your Instructor(s)

We encourage sending a brief note to your instructor through your NIC email address to introduce yourself as a dual credit student. Frequent communication with your instructor will be important for success in your course/program.

Find your instructor's email address in your myNIC account under "My Courses". Click on the course name to reveal the contact information.

☐ Review Course Syllabus

Review the syllabus for each course at the start of term to note important due dates for assignments and mid-terms.

Some instructors will provide the course syllabus via email before class starts, while others may provide it on Brightspace. If you have not received communications from your instructor prior to the first day of class, you can reach out to them directly with your NIC email address.



☐ Explore NIC Current Student Resources

As a dual credit student, you have access to all student resources at NIC, including advising, counselling, accessible learning services, Library and Learning Commons, Indigenous education resources, Career Services and Work Integrated Learning, and more. It's important to note that dual credit students do not qualify for financial aid. Contact your high school if you require financial support for your dual credit course(s).


EXPECTATIONS OF DUAL CREDIT STUDENTS

You can expect a welcoming, safe and inclusive environment as a student at NIC. In turn, you carry the responsibility of conducting yourself in a respectful manner and being prepared to learn.

As a member of the campus community in an adult learning environment, you are expected to

- Manage your time, allowing for at minimum two to three hours of study time for every one hour of in-class time per week.
- Attend each class prepared to learn and have the appropriate learning resources and supplies.
- Communicate frequently with your course instructor(s), including when classes are missed, and to make up assignments or exams as required.
- Communicate frequently with your high school counsellors and/or career coordinators regarding your course progress.
- Educate yourself on the procedure to drop/withdraw from a course, as the process may be different for a dual credit student. Connect with your high school if you wish to drop or withdraw from a course.

INDIGENOUS EDUCATION RESOURCES

NIC's Indigenous education team supports student success through academic advising, counselling, connection to culture through the Elders, and informal connections through events and spaces. Indigenous Student Services work closely to support both Indigenous and non- Indigenous students who may be seeking similar connections.

- The Indigenous counsellor assists students with their holistic health and has
 a special understanding of Indigenous mental health and traditions. Students
 are welcome to meet with the Indigenous counsellor while they're studying
 at NIC.
- Each campus has one or two Elders in Residence. The Elders support the college in a variety of ways and are available to meet with students who may be seeking a stronger connection to culture.

HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES STUDENT RESOURCES

Once you're invited to a health and human services program, you'll receive guidance from NIC towards completing special forms, receiving required immunizations, obtaining criminal record checks and completing pre-requisite training. Once your program begins, you can expect the following supports from your program:

- In-class orientation with your learning cohort during the first week of classes.
- Peer support from a learning cohort.
- Activities structured to build community within your learning cohort.
- Ongoing check-ins and feedback from your instructors.
- Referrals to student wellness supports at NIC.
